# ELECTION HERSTORY

**Two Texas women** made history in the November elections 100 years ago.

Women obtained the right to vote in Texas primaries earlier in 1918, and they strongly supported Annie Webb Blanton, a teacher and suffragist, in the Democratic primary in the race for superintendent of public instruction. She went on to win in November, becoming the first woman elected to statewide office in Texas.

Nellie Gray Robertson of Hood County was elected the first female county attorney in Texas, defeating her male opponent by a vote of 446-2.

Have thought about this all evening and feel it needs to be posted. It's a little long but please read it.

Was in Kyle Texas, today with my dad, who was having surgery, which went well. As he checked in they asked if he was a veteran. When he said he was, they asked if they could place a special band on his wrist. It was a red white and blue band with stars on it which would let everyone who dealt with him know he was a veteran. This band was acknowledged several times by hospital staff during his time there, including doctors and nurses. They also gave him a flag refrigerator magnet and a flag sticker to place on his window.

After the surgery, we were in recovery when I hear a "CODE RED, WHITE AND BLUE" with an associated room number announced three times over the hospital PA system. I noticed all nurses and techs, who were not immediately busy with a patient, hurry toward the elevators.

I had an idea what had happened, but I asked the tech,who was assisting my dad, what was going on. She said that the code meant a veteran had passed away and the staff was gathering in the hallway to line both sides of the hall, from the room to their exit from the hospital. They would honor a flag draped gurney. Shortly after that, the PA system played the full rendition of TAPS. There was not a dry eye in the recovery room.

As I exited the hospital shortly afterwards, I noticed a large number of staff returning to their various stations. It was obvious that this was a very touching experience for all involved.

I haven't identified the hospital, as they have not adopted this attitude to garner attention, but out of respect for veterans.

It was something I will never forget.

(This touched me, and I thought you should share it, also. So many times our younger generations don't really understand the sacrifices our Veterans actually did make for our freedom.) Nadyne
