

INTERNATIONAL WORLD FELLOWSHIP

The World Fellowship Program began in 1946 at the National Convention in San Francisco as a project to aid women in war-torn countries. Four German women educators received funds from Delta Kappa Gamma to spend eight weeks of study in Sweden during the spring of 1948. The current program began in 1960 with an initial award of \$2,500.00. World Fellowships are given annually to nonmembers from countries other than Canada and the United States to attend college/university in Canada or the U.S.

An agreement was made with the Institute of International Education to provide dossiers from which a Society committee could select recipients for study in the United States. The World Fellowship Committee maintains contact with recipients for the duration of their studies when possible. Delta Kappa Gamma chapters are encouraged to establish contact with recipients studying in their states. The DKG World Fellowship Committee received numerous applications last year from graduate students across the world. From these applications, they chose 20 recipients for \$4,000 scholarships each and provided 2 extensions of \$800 each and 4 extensions of \$400 each to recipients. Those previous receiving scholarships to work toward a master's or doctoral degree came from Central America, South America, Europe, Asia, the Middle East, and Africa and are now studying in universities in the United States and Canada. Their majors also cover the spectrum: education, law, dentistry, anthropology, theatre, instructional technology, organizational behavior, linguistics, geography, disability studies, urban planning, and many more. The fellowships are funded through state organization, chapter, and member donations, as well as bequests. The proceeds from Nu chapter's November silent auction will go to support the World Fellowship Fund.

HANDS OF HOPE

It can happen to anyone at any time. Overnight, a woman's life can change and that change can be overwhelming...job loss, floods, spousal loss, spousal abuse, divorce, addiction, disability, or illness. For others, its not a change, but a way of life that has been handed down from previous generations. Once a person's life appears hopeless, escape can prove difficult...but not impossible. To make this change for a woman, and more importantly for her children and their futures, she needs encouragement, nurture, support, and sufficiency. Hands of Hope strives to provide these. Hands of Hope is an adult educational ecumenical ministry here in San Marcos targeting under-educated and disadvantaged women, teaching them life and employment skills to move them toward selfsufficiency. This ministry, known internationally as Christian Women's Job Corp was launched in 1995, with Christian Mens' Job Corps launching a few years after. Now there are over 170 sites in the United States with 48 sites in Texas, 3 in Mexico, 1 in Venezuela, and 1 in South Africia. The local ministry was organized in 2004, and after going through extensive national training in Dallas, the first session was held in January 2005. Because of confusion with the Gary Job Corp here in San Marcos, the name Hands of Hope was adopted soon after.

The ministry is designed for two 10 week sessions each year, providing a broad curriculum of life skills and pre-job training in a context in which women being taught: Bible Study, Job Preparation, Individualized Computer Training, Communication, Writing, Exercise, Money Management, Personal Discovery, Language Arts, ESL (when needed), Honoring Your Anger, and Math. The current semester has a lady who is a non-reader and has a tutor who is working with her individually to help her learn to read. The program is offered at no cost to the participants and transportation, childcare, and a daily meal are provided.

Hands of Hope is conducted entirely by volunteers. The only paid positions are the van driver and the childcare center which works with us to provide a safe, stimulating environment for children under school age. Our faculty consists of retired certified teachers or individuals with professional expertise in the subjects they teach. Each participant has a mentor volunteer who meets with her weekly, supports and guides her, and prays for her during the 10 weeks, as well as, at least 6 months after the completion of the program. There is an on-going

Alumni program where we meet with the graduates a couple times a year.

Although sponsored and housed at First Baptist Church of San Marcos, Hands of Hope is an ecumenical effort supported by many local churches. Support comes from financial support, providing daily meals for the participants, and volunteers...coordinators, teachers, mentors, and members of our Advisory Council.

The Lead Coordinator functions much like a superintendent in a school setting. There are Co-Coordinators who are on duty everyday and function much like a principal supporting teachers, making sure they have what they need, and working out any problems that occur. During the 10 week sessions, classes meet Monday –Thursday from 8:45 to 1:30. This allows the ladies to get home before their school age children.

All come to Hands of Hope needing their self-esteem back. They are not judged, they receive care, support, and love. They come into the program with their heads down. After a couple of weeks they begin to open their lives and hearts; and most leave with their heads up, a goal to make their life and the lives of their family better, and hopefully the knowledge that there is a God who loves them. I wish you could hear their speeches at Celebration. They are so proud of themselves.

Nu members Charlotte Evans and Dr. Sue Thompson are both involved in Hands of Hope. Sue teaches Health and Nutrition and is responsible for buying paper good, drinks, and snacks for the ministry. Charlotte is the Lead Coordinator and oversees the ministry. For more information or to find out how you can help, please talk to either Charlotte or Sue. (Charlotte Evans and Dr. Sue Thompson)


